

Florian was born in Austria in the 4th century about 250 A.D. in Cetium (now in Austria). The St. Florian commemorated in the Roman Martyrology on May 4th, was an officer of the Roman army. He advanced in the ranks and occupied a high administrative post in Noricum, now part of Austria. The saint suffered "death for the Faith" in the days of Diocletian. Although he became an officer of the Roman army, he didn't observe a "don't ask, don't tell" policy and confessed to his Christianity in anti-Christian times.

His legendary "Acts" state that he gave himself up at Lorch to the soldiers of Aquilinus, the governor of Lorch,

when they were rounding up the Christians. The Emperor Diocletian was shocked to learn that Florian did not carry out his orders to persecute all Christians in the area, and, thus, was sentenced to death by fire. Standing on the funeral pyre, Florian is reputed to have challenged the Roman soldiers to light the fire, saying "If you do, I will climb to heaven on the flames." Apprehensive to his words, instead of burning Florian, he was flogged and

Ride for Heroes Bikers' Firefighter fundraiser

Sunday, December 19, 1999 Worcester, Massachusetts

Motorcycle clubs and riders from around New England conducted a fund-raiser for the families of the six firefighters who died in the Worcester Cold Storage blaze.

Braving the sunny but cold weather (It was 11 degrees Fahrenheit in northern Worcester County at 9 a.m.) the bikers gathered at the WFD Central Street Fire Station for the start of their run. After making a couple of stops around Worcester County the riders meandered through Worcester, to East Brookfield and Oxford, Mass.

Representatives from the Red Knights were part of the group that boasted some 800 bikes and riders that raised over \$10,000 for the firefighters' families.

Three of the brothers that were lost in the Worcester fire enjoyed motorcycles, one, Tim Jackson, was a member of Red Knights – Mass Chapter 4. One of those riding on December 19th noted on a local TV news station that he and Tim traveled to the Vietnam Memorial every year for *Rolling Thunder.* and that Tim always said to him that as a Vietnam Veteran that "the parade was for him." His friend said that now there is another ride for Tim and all those firefighters who have given the supreme sacrifice.

Organizers of the ride hope to make **Ride for Heroes** an annual Fall event in New England in memory of those firefighters who were lost in the warehouse fire.

For any Chapter that has hosted one of the annual conventions you know that Indiana-1 has been working hard. This work began shortly after last year's convention ended in preparation for the arrival of the Red Knights in Indianapolis this August.

Along with the work are some costs to the club. The primary way for Indiana to raise funds to pay for the club's convention expenses is through their convention program and ad book.

Now I can applicate a nice leisurely day of fishing, and I can definitely appreciate a ride on the bike through a back road on a nice Fall day — BUT here is President Gary Nelson's bike as he was getting ready to go fishing with some other members of Ontario-7... I've seen many bikes pulling trailers but this is the first time I've seen a boat being towed!

A story was told to me about this fishing trip as well. It seems the guys had pulled off at a little convenience store to get some supplies and maybe a coffee. A local habitual-patron of the nearby bar room stumbled out of the bar into the parking lot and just stood there staring at the bike and boat. What do you do to keep interest, excitement, and participation going strong in your chapter?

Some of our chapters have better luck (through all their work and effort) in keeping interest and participation alive. If you have found special events or "tricks of the trade" to help keep the members excited about the Red Knights please share them with us so we can share them with everyone! So what are your ideas?

The Pre-Trip Checklist

You love your motorcycle, so why not show it! Before you go out on a date with someone you love you always spend time getting ready. Pick out your clothes, shave (ladies legs, men faces), splash on some smelly stuff, brush your teeth, comb your hair, etc, etc. You spend time planning where you are going and what you will need before the date is over.

A ride on your bike should use the same thought planning process. Anytime you ride in a private plane you should see the pilot do a walk-around to check everything out. He doesn't want any surprises at 10,000 feet. On your next 2-wheeled ride to the corner 7-11 you will probably face more hazards and you are in far greater danger than that pilot will ever be. So let's do a pre-trip check.

Tires and Wheels. Check tread depth, condition, foreign material, wear, cracking,

etc. Check tire inflation level before you ride to be sure it's within manufacturer's

recommendations.

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Lubrication. With the bike on its center stand check the oil. The level, it's condition, what does it look like? Check color, particles, and the date of the last oil and filter change.
Fuel. Do you have enough to get you where you're going? Any signs of a fuel leak, puddles of gas, or an odor? Has it been a long time with the same gas? —like over the Winter?
Engine. Take a look at your engine (sometimes easier said than done). Is there anything loose or are there any fluid leaks? Anything jammed into the radiator? Are the highway boards and other accessories secured properly?
Cables and Hoses. Are cables clean? Dirt makes them stick. Is there any wear? Do they need to be lubricated? Do any of the cables need adjustment? Check the hoses for leaks or any signs of weeping.
Lights. Check your headlight — high and low beam. Does it point where it should, even when you're carrying a passenger? Tail light, license plate and brake light, directional lights, hazard lights, and marker lights should all be working.
Brakes. Is the reservoir filled to between the O.K. lines for both the front and rear brakes? How about the clutch fluid? Is it really dark? When was the last time it was changed? Do the rotors show signs of excessive wear? Roll the bike off the stand and apply the brakes one at a time. How do they feel? —spongy, too hard, feel normal??? Any squeals from the brakes?
Electrical System. When was the last time you checked the water level in the battery? Do you have any spare fuses with you? Does the horn work? How about all those switches — turning things on and off like the design engineers designed them to operate?
Paperwork and Stuff. Have you got your license, registration, and insurance information? Not that you'll need them for a speeding ticket but you might need a picture I.D. to write that check for the ice cream sundae supreme later in the trip. First aid kit? Sun Block? Spare set of Sunglasses? Spare key? Cell phone?
Take time to think before the ride. The few moments you take now could save a lifetime later.

Carrying Things

There are six areas into which you can pack gear onto you and your bike. Here's some guidance on what to pack where:

- Jacket Pockets: For small items frequently needed such as keys, ear plugs, moisture lotion, pocket camera.
- Tank Baq: For items frequently used such as extra gloves, shield cleaner and rag, notebook, tire gauge, spare sweater.
- Fairing Pockets: If your dresser has them, they are for any of the items listed in either of the above two spaces — as long as they are not adversely effected by vibra-
- <u>Passenger Seat</u>: When traveling alone, the rear portion of the seat can be used to haul a seat bag, duffel bag, tent, or sleeping bag.
- Saddlebags: For heavy basic items such as clothing, shoes, extra tools, cooking gear.
- Trunk: Located high and behind the rear axle, the trunk should be used only for lighter, less bulky items such as rain suits, tent, and sleeping bag.


