HOW DID WE SURVIVE?

Looking back, it's hard to believe that we have lived as long as we have:

- As children we would ride in cars with no car seats, seat belts or air bags. Riding in the back of a pickup truck on a warm day was always a special treat.
- Our baby cribs were painted with bright colored, lead based paint that we often ingested when we chewed on the bars.
- We didn't wear Pampers, the diapers were cloth that needed to be washed and were attached with safety pins.
- We had no childproof lids on medicine bottles, doors, or cabinets, and when we rode our bikes we had no helmets.
- We wore roller skates with 4 metal wheels that we would strapon over our Keds and tighten with a skate key that hung around our neck on a shoelace, with no helmet, knee or elbow pads.
- When we came home with a scraped knee it was met with a spray of Bactine, and out we would go again.
- We drank water from the garden hose and not from a bottle.
- We would spend hours building our go-carts out of scraps and then rode down the hill, only to find out we forgot the brakes. After running into the bushes a few times we learned to solve the problem.
- We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the streetlights came on. No one was able to reach us all day.
- We played dodgeball and sometimes the ball would really hurt.
- We ate cupcakes, bread and butter, wax lips and drank sugar soda, but we were never overweight - we were always outside playing.
- Little League had tryouts and not everyone made the team.
 Those who didn't had to learn to deal with disappointment.
- Some students weren't as smart as others so they failed a grade and were held back to repeat the same grade. We brought home a few schoolbooks, not backpacks that weigh 25 pounds.
- We were taught manners, proper grammar, and respect for authority, elders and country.
- Our parents took us to church and Sunday school, raised us with a sense of patriotism, and disciplined us regularly often with a belt!"
- Hardly any of our classmates were on Ritalin or in therapy, and there was no such thing as a "time out" to think about what we had done wrong - bad behavior was clearly defined, the consequences were known and enforced swiftly.
- The majority of us returned home from school to mom (there were no daycare centers or latchkey programs) with an afternoon snack ready and a homemade dinner being prepared nothing instant, frozen or microwaveable!
- There was a solid triangle made up of home, church and school that was a consistent force in our everyday lives, with any of them individually reinforcing the teachings of the other.
- Our 45rpm records lasted under 3 minutes and did not have parental advisory warnings. There was no MTV or VH-1, the whole family gathered around the one TV in the house.

That generation produced some of the greatest risk-takers and problem solvers in history. We had the freedom, failure, successes and responsibility, and we learned how to deal with it all whether we liked it or not.

Welcome to all our new M.A.L.'s and new chapters. The Red Knights now have over 200 members-at-large (including members in Europe) and 132 chapters. Our new chapters since the last newsletter are:

What is the Grand Tour

When the club was young, the easiest way to tell others about it was by word of mouth. This meant that the members had to get out to visit other firefighters in their areas, and one of the best ways to do that was to visit Fire Stations. Someone came up with the idea of rewarding members who made a certain number of visits with a certificate and a pin. Proof of these visits was needed and so the idea of Grand Tour was born.

How do I earn a Grand Tour Pin

In order to earn a Grand Tour Pin you must first get an application form from the G.T. chairperson, then during the course of one (1) riding season you must visit nine (9) fire Stations whose names begin with the letters G R A N D T O U R, or twelve Fire Stations beginning with any letter of the alphabet (this is for members who live in some of the more remote areas and

n d t o u r). You must have a picture of you and your motorcycle taken at each Station, with the name sign visible. Co-riders may also earn a pin and a rider and co-rider may have their picture taken together.

When you have completed your visits simply fill out the application form and return it with your pictures to the GT chairperson and he/she will send you your certificate and pin.

Photo albums will be kept displaying pictures of everyone who has completed the Grand Tour and will be available at all future conventions. So if you would like to see this program continue please get out there and support it.

Gerald had a vision. It was his dream to restore the bike and ride with his buddies on the streets of NYC. Gerald never got to fulfill his dream because shortly afterwards, he responded to the WTC on September 11.

His sad, beat up old '79 Honda lay against the firehouse wall where the other men ignored it for months. It made them too sad to think of what it meant.

One day a writer for Backroads Motorcycle Touring magazine saw the bike and asked about it. When he was told the story, he reported back to the editors of Backroads who published a small article about it in their newspaper. It was suggested the bike be restored and sold somehow with any money raised going to the firefighters' memorial fund and the deceased's family.

The bike was sent to Cycle Service and Accessories in Newton, NJ where they worked for seven months on the project. People donated many hours of labor and manufacturers and dealers contributed parts and skills to the project. Everything was given to the project: tires, battery, springs, windshield, chrome plating, paint, graphics, American Honda stock parts and more. It was a wonderful joint effort to fulfill a hero's dream.

The dream became a reality when the bike was returned home to NY City to go on display at the motorcycle show held at the Jacob Javitz Center in January. After the show, the bike was moved back to its home at Ladder Company 9 on Great Jones Street. The men in the company were speechless when they saw the bike. They only knew it as the old beat up looking bike lying against the wall months before. It now stood before them in fire engine red and white colors, complete with their company tattoo, logo, and FDNY shield.

It is the goal of the restorers to put the bike up for auction with all proceeds going to the memorial fund and Gerald's family. It is not confirmed yet but they are thinking of setting the opening date for bidding on eBay as 9/11/03. The promoters of the restoration project, Carol Lee Spages and Steve Lovas of Cycle Service and Accessories hope to have the bike on display in both Bike Week in Daytona and Americade in Lake George.

Please look for this wonderful work of love in your travels.

Blanket Insurance Policy

The International has again purchased a blanket insurance policy to help chapters in defraying insurance expenses for their individual chapter sponsored events.

Anytime your chapter sponsors an event you should purchase insurance. Insurance not only to protect your chapter and its members, but also to protect The Red Knights International from a lawsuit brought on by an accident or incident at or traveling to your function and not covered by the individual's insurance policy.

Any chapter having purchased insurance to cover them in the past knows the cost and time involved in obtaining coverage. As your secretary I will assume the duties of getting your event covered with \$1,000,000.00 individual participant legal liability coverage.

The International has again purchased a bank type insurance policy. Let me put this in terms we as firefighters can understand. The International has purchased \$1,200.00 worth of insurance. Think of this as a bank account. As each event is insured the amount of the coverage is deducted from this amount.

For example if the convention coverage costs \$400.00 it would leave us with \$800.00 of purchasable coverage. Each event would be covered for the entirety of the event for one fee. For example if you held a three-day weekend or a one-night dance they would both be the same fee. The number of participants expected for the event steps up the fee.

Below is the current fee schedule for the events and the basic attendance ranges.

Any and all questions should be forwarded to the International Secretary. I will handle all monies and forms. Each individual policy shall be written to cover the host chapter as well as the International.

Here is the fee schedule for events. 1-250 participants – \$100.00; 251-500 participants - \$130.00. If you have an event with more than 500 contact me for the information. These fees include all postage and handling.

See Rider

Too many crashes happen because drivers just don't motorcycles. So see always double-check your mirrors and don't be blind to motorcycles. And if you're a rider, stay out of blind spots and never traffic. through weave Drive and ride responsibly so every trip can end on a safe note.

I mount up early Sunday morning. I am off on a small sabbatical. I have no particular goal or destination in mind, no tangible result to be calibrated by contracts, numbers, dates or deliverables. Rather, I head down a grey ribbon of random road and let what will come, come to me

The wind whisks over the windshield, into my face, up my nostrils and into my brain, blowing away a week's worth of mind clutter. The rising sun lingers over lush, green forest, sparkling corn and black fields lying fallow in the cool air. My machine and I dance through curves, over hillsides and in and out of tree shadows dappled by sunlight. I am not riding the bike as much as wearing it.

In this age of global positioning satellite systems, veteran sailors sometimes use an obsolete sextant to confirm their place in the world and to draw comfort from belonging where they are.

GPS tells them their physical location within a few feet of anywhere in the world. But the sextant triangulates their position in history and among the stars, not geography. It is a reminder of the relative size and age of things and of the need for humility, regardless of the depth of their keel or breadth of their beam.

Riding, then, is a positional fix for the soul. Like a farmer on a Sunday drive tasting his fields or a sailor on the deck with a sextant sniffing the cosmos, I'm riding music and bike in search of spiritual bearings in a warp-speed world.

Important Insurance Information

For those of you (U.S. Members) who are planning to travel to Canada for the convention (or anytime), just a reminder that Insurance Regulations in Canada require that you have a **Canadian Insurance Card** from you U.S. insurance carrier.

You do not need to get additional insurance, but whether you are traveling on two wheels or by four, you need to visit your insurance agent and get a Canadian Insurance Card.
