Thank y'all for all the support as I have tried to do everything in my power to help this organization grow in a manner that will make our Members flourish and stay safe on the roads without hassle from outside organizations. This is no longer your dads Red Knights; big changes are coming from a whole new generation of Red Knights, and it is now time for me to step out of the way and watch.

Your International Secretary has been very busy since the last time I sent out this report. I was able to attend the Spring Board Meeting in Baltimore, and man was it good to see everyone in person! I also attended all the monthly Zoom meetings your board has been having to remain up with current events and spoke with quite a few Chapters and Members during the past year. I have spent an average of 25+ hours a week on my secretary duties. These include email, reports, conference calls, meetings, TMLA's, insurance, new Chapter information, and all the smaller behind the scenes work that is always done just to keep things organized. I can tell you that not getting together as much has led to some very creative items for sale from our Chapters.

Since the inception of the digital signature TMLA process, we have successfully approved almost 1000 new TMLA's with an average turnaround time of just over two hours! Thanks to the COVID restrictions, I have received a record number of applications for TMLA's. I am happy to say that improvements of the TMLA program are working wonderfully. Please remember that the application and the artwork must be submitted together, electronically. All applications and artwork are now saved electronically and if you mail me bad artwork, I cannot accept it as it will not scan properly. Please also remember that ANY design that you create with our name or logo <u>MUST</u> have the required ®. If the registered trademark is not plainly visible

when I receive the application, it will be returned with a quick reminder! Please do not make items that have not been approved or does not contain the ®. If you have a question on whether an item needs a TMLA, it probably does, and you can send a quick email to make sure. Don't miss the breakout session at Convention on Friday morning.

We have added more new Chapters this year. As of now, only new formed Chapters are receiving membership cards in their new Chapter packet. We are still looking into a better membership card that will work for all of us.

We have insured twenty-eight (28) events so far, this year. The season is gearing up here in North America, so I see a lot more events being insured. Please take advantage of this great program we have. It is a good piece of mind for the Chapter for a very low cost. The cost has gone up a bit from previous years, but it is still a very inexpensive piece of mind for the hosts of the events. If you have any questions about the insurance, please call or email me. Don't miss the breakout session at Convention on Friday morning.

The advertising in our low membership areas has hit its stride and I am looking forward to getting the calls and emails asking for more information soon. Our MAL's are doing a great job in forming multiple new Chapters this past year!

Just as a reminder for ALL Chapters. Make sure your email is up and running and being checked by someone because ALL official documentation (TMLA's and Insurance Certificates) coming from this office will ONLY go to the Chapter email address assigned by the RKIFMC.

I would like to take this time again, to thank everyone for their support over the past 15 years that I have had the privilege to serve you in the respective positions I have been elected to. I will be retiring as your International Secretary at the 2022 Convention and will not be seeking any new position on the board. It has been a great ride and I hope that I have done my part to improve this amazing organization. It is now time for Marie and me to ride off into the sunset and enjoy the organization and all our brothers and sisters from out behind that table!! And MIMI and POPS are going to enjoy our time with our new granddaughter!!

From the desk of your treasurer

In the hopes I can save us all some grief, in this newsletter I want to dig a little deeper into Membership categories.

First, I will point out that Membership categories are detailed in the bylaws, which are changed and passed by a super majority of the chapters at an AGM. Not that long ago, "Grandchild" was added to the Social Member category. No big deal, right? Wrong. That is a huge deal. What that change signaled is that the list of relationships is a firm definitive list which you as members have the power to change and I as Treasurer have the responsibility to follow. The list of relationships is not "people LIKE mother, father"... So my Aunt, who was like a mother to me, cannot be a Social Member; my friend in high school who taught me to tie my shoelaces and is like a brother to me, cannot be a Social Member; my mother-in-law is not like my mother and cannot be a Social Member – can I get an amen. Those relations cannot be Social Members YET. If we, as a body, want to include more relations as Social Members then we, as a body by super majority, need to change the list. To start the process to change the list is easy – fire an email off to bylaws@redknightsmc.com to get the ball rolling. To be clear, no, I do not think the Founders meant to exclude grandchildren, just as a I do not think we as a body meant to exclude them every year until the bylaws were finally changed to include them. BUT, until the bylaws were changed to definitively include them, we could not add them as Social Members.

I'm not done yet. There are a number of other relations that are not included in the bylaws. Some of which I suspect nobody meant to exclude. But it is only my opinion and that doesn't matter until the bylaws change. I suspect a super majority of people would agree with me that step-relations should be considered. I'm sure lots, but maybe not a super majority, would agree in-laws should be considered.

I am not confident aunts, uncles, nephews, nieces, cousins would make the list. I'll come back to this later when I talk about Associate Members.

There is a reason why people may not agree to include some of the relations noted above. Social Members get a vote in chapter business. The bylaws are not 100% clear on what it takes to bring a Social Member onto the roster. That is, it doesn't explicitly state that they need to be voted in. Arguably, a person could walk into a Chapter AGM with a dozen new Social Members and influence the results of an election. Just so ya know, that's not a hypothetical problem, it has been tried.

Also not clear in the bylaws is what it takes to be an Associate Member. It doesn't explicitly state that an Associate Member has to have a motorcycle license. This means it is possible for extended family to join a chapter as an Associate even if the bylaws are not changed to expand Social Membership. Just remember, Associate Members cannot exceed 10% of Active Members. On that note, just to clarify, that is 10% of the members who qualify for Active Membership, not 10% of members who show up for rides and are otherwise active in the chapter. Too often, chapters try to bring on Associate Members putting them over the 1 in 10 Active and that just opens the door for someone to get very embarrassed.

While I'm on a run of clarifying membership categories, the other misunderstood category is Honorary Member. Honorary Members are limited to a chapter Chaplain and to civic or business leaders who do volunteer work for the chapter. This is not a catchall category. This is not a place for your favourite hockey team's mascot, not a place to list a restaurant where you hold your meetings, not a place for your pet, and I am sorry this sounds so cold hearted, but it is not a place for make-a-wish to get a vest for a child. Yes, it is an absolute honor to be in the Red Knights, and it would be great to honor anyone on that last list with a membership. BUT, a super majority of our members have not structured our bylaws that way. Please see our SOGs, section 12:03 and the Friends of the Red Knights (FORK) for this sort of recognition instead.

As always, if you have any questions I'm here to answer them. It's always best to fire an email off to me so I have time to research the specifics of the case and help you determine the best place for people looking to join our club.

The support we offer each other in person, on Facebook, and on zoom is amazing; I am honored to a part of this organization. I have worked in construction and the concrete industry for the last 33 years.

I have had to multitask and be flexible every day, as most of us have to do in the fire service as well, and I believe I am proficient at it. I am familiar with PDF files, word programs, and know my way around excel pretty good.

If elected secretary, I hope to bring whatever skills I have to continue the good work already done by Jack Jarvis and help to keep the membership up to date about what is going on in the organization. History of the Challenge Coin

The history of military challenge coins is widely debated, and their origin is rooted in the history of civilizations from the Romans to the American colonials. But there's no doubt that military challenge coins are a big part of military culture and increasingly so in the civilian world. Challenge coins are a great way to boost morale, identify allegiance and are a terrific way to extend one's appreciation by saying "thank you" with coin in hand and a firm handshake. Moreover, challenge coins—specifically in military units—demonstrate "proof of membership" and affiliation with a specific unit or element extending esprit de corps and morale in its proud members. Then, there is the time-honored tradition of slamming your unit challenge coin down in bars to see who has theirs. He who is last or without buys the first round. The traditions of unit challenge coins date back to the World Wars, but their true origin is steeped in myths and legends. Regardless, challenge coins are fun to give, receive and display.

Today, we'll explore the history of military challenge coins, examine their possible origins and explain how military challenge coins have made their way into the White House, the United States Congress and the highest levels of the Pentagon, as senior government leaders have pressed their own challenge coins to present to well-deserving recipients. While the specific origin of military challenge coins may never be known, we can certainly trace its history back to the first stamped coinage of the Roman Empire and its legionnaires.

The Romans Built this Place

During ancient times, kings and emperors shaped precious metals with their image as currency for the exchange of goods and services. The Roman Emperor Maximus was one such leader who also had legionaries who fought for Rome. The legionnaire was not always a Roman citizen, but often mercenaries who fought for payment of their professional skills. They were often rewarded handsomely by the emperors of Rome for their exploits in battle, as it was in the best interest of the emperor to keep his military force well financed. The payment of legionnaires in pressed, metal coins is likely the first recorded military challenge coin in the history of warfare and, if not, it's a good place to begin. The Romans were among the first to stamp precious metals into coins, and given their veracity of large-scale military forces, why not bestow upon the Romans the mythological origin of challenge coins.

The Great Wars of the World

One particular story dates military challenge coins back to World War I (1914-1918) and a wealthy military officer who had bronze medallions struck with his flying squadron insignia stamped on them. He presented the coins to each member of the squadron before they departed on missions over Europe. One day, a pilot was shot down over Germany and later captured by German soldiers and held captive as a prisoner of war. He was stripped of all personal belongings and identification by the Germans and only had his personal clothing and a small leather pouch that contained a squadron coin inside. The pilot eventually escaped his German captors and made his way back to France. The French, who retained him, thought he was a spy. Upon discovery of the squadron medallion, he was recognized as an American and later returned to his unit. The coin saved his life and earned him the recognition as an American Soldier.

Clandestine Operations in the Vietnam War

The United States of America's entrance into the Vietnam War (1956-1975) first consisted of U.S. special operations forces working with the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) conducting clandestine operations against the North Vietnamese Army and Viet Cong. The nature of the military clandestine mission was such that the actions of many American special operations Soldiers were not recognized overtly by the United States Army with medals and ribbons. The 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) participated in many of these clandestine missions over the years in Southeast Asia with little to no fanfare.

As legend has it, the Commander and Sergeant Major of the 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne), in order to properly recognize their men, designed a military challenge coin to present to them. On the front was

the unit's name, a beret flash with the numeral one in the top right and a sword pointing up, signifying the unit was ready for combat, and an eagle on top spreading its wings. On the reverse side, was the Special Forces motto "De Oppresso Liber," the traditional Green Beret, a bayonet and scroll and a blank space to enumerate the coin for prosperity. The command kept a detailed registry to record the name, date and mission of each recipient. The 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) coin was a way for the command to formally recognize their men and their accomplishments when formal acknowledgment by the Army was openly frowned upon.

The story of the 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) presenting coins to men in secrecy deep in the jungles of Southwest Asia is a story of legendary proportions. The dark, shadowy nature of the special operations forces coupled with the CIA only adds to the mythological nature regarding the historical origins of military challenge coins.

Today, the 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) retains the original design it had during the Vietnam War, and it continues to conduct missions throughout Asia as part of its heritage. The coin is legendary, as its own history within special operations lore only adds mythological proportions as to the true origins of military challenge coins. The tradition continues then and now.

The 'Coin Check'

Today, a popular tradition at unit social functions, formal events and in local bars is the "coin check." The popular coin check dates back to the Vietnam War and the bars run by military service members at the forward operating bases (FOB) and combat outpost (COB). As the story goes, military service members were to present enemy bullets or their unit challenge coin to gain entrance into the bar.

The tradition continues today when someone yells out "coin check" and then slaps their coin onto the bar and all military members—active duty and veterans—are to respond in kind by placing their coin on the bar. The last one to present their coin or the one who shamefully is without theirs has to buy the round of alcoholic drinks for the group. Oftentimes, there are strong verbal arguments initially regarding whose coin is more senior to the other coins. The older the coin, the more senior. But also, the more senior in rank the person's coin is, based on rank of the presenter, wins out in the end.

The coin check is a great icebreaker and gets folks talking about their personal experiences. It brings out the pride many of our service members feel regarding their service during a specific era, a specific branch and a specific mission they participated in. It starts the stories flowing at the bar that last well into the late evening and early morning hours.

History of the Coin in the RKMC

There are existing two types of coins.

- 1. The coin that is given at rallies, events or chapter parties. It's often called a challenge coin, but is in fact a collector coin or event coin.
- 2. The challenge coin.

The tradition of the RKMC challenge coin is also known in our club. Officers from the international board, such as members have their own coins. They are presented to you, if you have done something that in the eyes of the Coin presenter was special and wide over his duties.

How the rules and the meaning of the coin are, will be explained by the person who presents it to you.

2022 Americade - Founding Fathers Dinner

Thursday, June 9, 2022

As most North Americans know, Americade[®] is motorcycle rally held annually in Lake George, NY, on the shores of the lake by the same name during the first full week of June, after Memorial Day. Since the mid to late 1980's there has been a ride sponsored by NY 3 (Albany) and a dinner sponsored by the RKMC[®] and NY 11 (Lake George) and NY 12 (Wilton), used as a recruiting tool for the Club, on the Thursday of the weeklong rally. The dinner is held at the Lake George Volunteer Fire Department with members of that department assisting in the preparation and serving of the meal.

Like everything else, the illustrious virus known as CoVid-19 put a damper on the Rally in 2020. In 2021 Americade® was once again held but (at least) one thing changed. NY 3 still led the Thursday ride but the dinner sponsored and hosted by NY 11 took a new direction. The dinner was renamed the "Founding Fathers' Dinner" partly in the memory of Bob Hollner, the president of NY 12 who passed away unexpectedly, and who had suggested the change but never got to see it happen. The dinner was well attended, but only a handful of the Founders were able to make the trip north.

This year, Bob Binnall, President of MA 15 (and the chairman of Yankee 2019, known as the Founding Fathers Rally that year), along with the help of a number of others went a step beyond the ordinary and, using funds raised last year for the event, arranged for a 14 seat van to pick up all the Founders able to attend this year at the RKMC® Memorial Hall in Boylston, MA. By the time Yankee Rally "Take 2 in '22" was underway, only 4 of the 6 Founders still living in Massachusetts were onboard – Don Parker, Ed Wright, Jon Tripp and Dave Hunt, along with Dot Parker and Jackie Hamilton, wife of the late first International President Dave Hamilton. Being from Florida, and 1,100 miles away, I was not planning on going to Americade® as I had already been to the UK/Ireland meet in Blackpool, England, The Dixie Rally in Brunswick, GA, and the Yankee Rally in Plattsburg, NY, with the Western, Atlantic, Convention, Bootlegger and EuCon still on my plate. Our last Founding Father, Jack Pierce, is in New Mexico and we have been unable to reach him.

Any of you that know Brother Binnall will attest that the man is relentless. He is persistent, and he is tirelessly relentless. By the way, did I mention he can be relentless? Well, working on me, and in a way, my wife, he convinced me to attend. Down to 2 not coming, right? This year's Yankee was the best attended (Yankee) Rally to date (arguably contested by the folks from Vermont) and 5 of the 8 living Founders were in attendance but one of them was not planning to attend the dinner. Bring on Bob the Relentless, with a little help from his friends. By the end of Yankee, Bob Bourassa was convinced to join the party. So the MA 1 contingent (and FL 14, too) headed back to Boylston with the assignment to convince the one holdout he needed to join us.

By the end of day Monday, with little persuasion necessary, Roger Wentzell agreed to join the party. This would be only the 4th time in 15 years that all the Founders (with the exception of Jack Pierce) would be together at a public gathering of Red Knights[®] (we are together several times a year chapter at meetings).

On Thursday morning, June 9, at 09:30, the van arrived at Memorial Hall where all but Roger



boarded for the trip of the decade. Along with Peter Stone, MA 1 president, we left to pick up Roger at his house and away we went. Three hours and 140 miles later we arrived at the Lake George Fire Hall and were greeted by about 50 members of the Red Knights® that were there waiting for us. What a rush! We greeted everyone, and everyone greeted us. One highlight of the day was the moment Geo®ge Colby had Jackie Hamilton get on the back of his bike and a small parade escorted her on the first ride she's taken on a motorcycle since Dave passed away. The ride returned and dinner was served. It would be my guess that there were approximately 125 people in attendance. After the cake was served there were raffles and a 50/50, won by a Founder and returned to the fundraiser, then the old guys headed home. We were back in Boylston by 19:45 with memories of a lifetime.

You all always say "thank you" and "without what you did, we wouldn't be here today", and we always, in return, say THANK YOU, because without YOU, our dream wouldn't have come true. 
Just a Shout out as always to our annual event held in our region as always!

Two European Red Knights, Ryk Matysiak and Sven Coopman have been working tirelessly to help provide aid for Ukrainian citizens and firefighters who have been affected by the Russian invasion of their country.

England 2 member Ryk Matysiak started the `Untied for Ukraine` movement and began collecting items to send to Poland, he soon had to open more collection points in and around Barnsley, South Yorkshire such was the response to his messages for help. Collection points quickly filled up with clothing, toys, food and medical items and through Ryk's contacts in Poland he was able to arrange for lorries to collect and take the donations to where they were needed in Poland.

Word about Ryk's efforts soon spread in the area and articles appeared in the press, he and his band of volunteers were inundated with donations and have filled and sent eight lorries, that's more than 130 tonnes of donations to Poland.

had a discussion with UK MAL Kev Normansell about what could be done to help firefighters in Ukraine and the idea of a `United for Ukraine` patch was born.

Within the hell on earth that is Kiev there are still those brave few who keep helping and saving people, and those need our support.



For that reason Sven offered the patch you see opposite for sale. This fundraiser is in support of the firefighters in Kiev, and all proceeds will go

directly to the fire department, no middleman.

Sven was also happy to receive donations from those who wish to support the Ukrainian firefighters without buying a patch.



An initial order for 1000 patches was placed, 945 of which were quickly snatched up by Red Knights members across the world, those who were not lucky enough to buy a patch in this initial 1000 were already asking if they could order from a second batch and by the beginning of April Sven had informed the membership that a second batch would be ordered and these too quickly sold out for a second time.


After all the available patches had been sold and posted out Sven had raised €14,000 which was used to buy items needed by the Ukrainian Firefighters.



NZ6 were pleased to present Nelson Tasman Hospice with a donation of \$1500.


